

Adverts, live review, UK Mountain discography and a mega competition. All in a random order.

Welcome Headbangers and Hippies to issue 2 of the fanzine. Many of you will have already read issue 1. The response to the first issue was small in numbers yet very positive. I probably gave away more review copies than actually sold, a mistake I hope not to repeat, especially as only 1 review (or mention) appeared. Never trust a music journalist — ever.

Anyway, 'No Jive' has only recently appeared in the US, and the band, having returned from Europe, will be making several trips over there, with a UK tour hopefully in November, accompanied by Uriah Heep. European and UK dates will be printed as soon as they come in.

The Dan McCafferty solo CD release has been put on hold, but the From The Vaults CD is now available on Sequal. There are a few non LP A-sides, the live double single and two studio tracks from 'Snaz (not on the CD reissue), the rest are non LP b-sides, although some appear on other CD compilations. The full track listing is:- Friends, If You See My Baby, Hard Living, Spinning Top, Love Hurts, Down, My White Bicycle, Holy Roller, Railroad Boy, You're The Violin (DJ edit), Good Love, Greens, Desolation Road, Hearts Grown Cold LIVE, Razamanaz LIVE, Hair Of The Dog LIVE, Talkin' To One Of The Boys LIVE, Morning Dew (1981), Juicy Lucy and On The Run. This last track is an out take from Sound Elixir, issued as a b-side in Germany. Many of the tracks were de-clicked from the original records - an interesting afternoon spent in a mastering studio with Mark Brennan, a bag of records and more tea than I could drink. While tracking down details of the track 'On The Run' for the CD, I had to sing it to Billy before he recognised it, and Darrell didn't think the track had been finished until I showed him the 'Where Are You Now' single on which it appears.

For those of you short on live material, the BBC Radio 1 Live In Concert CD is still available on Windsong. One of the better in the series, recorded in 1972/73. Also recorded in 1972 was the Sensational Alex Harvey Band live CD in the same series, featuring Zal Cleminson.

I've been given permission by the band to reproduce some of the literature from the original fan club, so some of that will appear shortly.

Letters and reviews will be printed, at my discretion, for free. I will also accept adverts (for sale, wanted, swaps, personal etc) at £2 a time. No bootlegs at all for sale, at the band's request and for my own safety. I would appreciate it if all adverts were Nazareth or related (eg Dan McCafferty, Alex Harvey etc).

# Nazareth Middlesborough Crypt/Town Hall 3rd October 1992.

At the start of 1992 Nazareth announced tour dates in the UK to promote their new LP No Jive. These were the band's first dates in the UK since the Catch tour in 1984, and their first with Billy Rankin on lead guitar, replacing Manny Charlton. I was luck to see the band on two of these dates, and the 8 year wait was well worth it, as was the trip from Bristol when they announced some extra dates in the north.

NAZ finally took to the stage to enormous applause, the atmosphere was brilliant, with the crowd obviously very pleased to see the lads again. Hire And Fire, and Do You Want To Play House, from the new album kicked off the show in fine style. With the band in menacing form we were in for another great night. Then came the classic Razamanaz, a live favourite for many years, and still sounding as good as the day I first heard it.

As with the gigs earlier in the year, the boys played a lot more of their older material, including Gone Dead Train, Alcatraz and a brilliant version of their My White Bicycle that sounded much heavier and faster than the original.

At this point Nazareth changed the pace completely with a traditional Scottish song called The Black Veil with Billy and Pete joining Darrell on marching drums. The song fitted nicely into the set and gave us all a well earned breather. Another great live song Bad, Bad Boy had Billy playing some fine slide guitar, as did the brilliant Vigilante Man and showing that Dan has a great voice for the blues.

The excellent Right Between The Eyes from No Jive was next. This will surely become a Nazareth classic in years to come. Love Hurts as always had everyone singing along, all the band need to do was play. This was followed by Hair Of The Dog with dan playing his famous bagpipes. The band closed the show with This Flight Tonight, returning for an encore of Broken Down Angel and a great version of the ZZ Top classic Tush, ending what was another brilliant Nazareth concert. Let's hope in 1993 we will be able to repeat this great night.

If anyone else would like to try to do a live review, do what Keith did and see them live, as I never have. Try to keep it to 300-400 words. I'll also print letters and queries (150 words) if you want. Reviews and information on non UK releases more than welcome.

A few of you may be interested to know that 'Friends', the b-side to the band's first single 'Dear John' was intended for release on the first LP. I know of a Trident Metal Acetate on 'Nazareth' with 'Friends' on. It was pulled by the record company because of production problems, amongst other reasons. Don't ever expect another of these discs to turn up. Also, I've been told by a few avid fans that the b-side to 'If You See My Baby' is 'Hard Living' and not 'Hard Luck'. I've since seen a European copy in a p/s that plays 'Hard Living' but states 'Hard Luck' on the label.

Depending on how Record Collector get on with my article on Nazareth, I may have to print a full discography in these pages when I've finished cataloguing everything.

For now let's crack on with UK releases on Mountain. This was done with the help of Angus Woodhams, who got me into Nazareth in the first place.

Fanzine One of the few official compilations and probably the best. The first album on Mountain that accompanied reissues of all previous albums, it covers the Pegasus and Mooncrest years well. Included are two non LP Mooncrest singles and Holy Roller, their first new material for Mountain, making number 36 in the singles charts. About this time, Pete was about to become a father, so this fills a gap very nicely. Dan took the time to release a solo LP of cover versions. Some nice photos on the innersleeve, and adequate information on the back. The German issue had three extra tracks; a record company decision. An American equivalent a few years later was called Hot Tracks, with the same cover as the UK EP.

Angus Perhaps a slightly restricted choice with only 1 track from the first two albums, but some good songs on there nevertheless.

Dan A great compilation.

Darrell A marvellous compilation, although at the time I did have reservations about a greatest hits package so early in our career. It was a multi million seller, and still sells well.

Fanzine A very good album, although not as raw as Hair of the Dog. 'Telegram Pts 1-4' makes the album worth buying on its own. Wasn't a chart success in this country, along with the singles, but they could have done worse. Weird cover of faces (fans?) pressed up against a car, with a band photo on the gatefold. Album details and the lyrics to just 'Telegram pts 1,2,3' on the innersleeve.

Angus A bit of a lightweight album compared with previous recordings. 'Telegram' is much better live.

Dan 'Telegram' was like, about touring. We've always done songs about what we know. You can't do it otherwise. It worked for us.

Darrell We had always been a touring band, and it was the travelling and partying in between gigs that really tired you out. I think with 'Telegram' we actually said what so many other bands wanted to say. It became an anthem and it opened our set for 10 years. When we dropped it and started with something else, you could see the disappointment in the fan's faces. They'd come to see 'Telegram'.

Dan I will say that it was tongue in cheek. I think a lot fans got it, but these 'I'm a serious critique' didn't and wondered what we were bitching about.

Darrell The singles were record company decisions. They chose the b-sides, the packaging, everything.

Dan Oh, they do. They own the band, the tapes, they have that power. The singles they chose were probably the best choices. 'Telegram' was used as a b-side a few years later. We did argue that but were told sort of 'Shut your mouth'.


Darrell We always had a lot to say about the packaging of the albums because it was us who were doing the thing and it's what the fans wanted. It's much nicer to buy an album with some decent packaging. We find that ourselves. We became a thorn in the record company's side.

Fanzine Much more bluesy and laid back. Slightly more radio play orientated without being commercial. Promoted by two singles and a 12" album sampler, without success. The singles were better than those from Close Enough For Rock'N'Roll but the LP lacked an awful lot on the whole. 'I Want To Do Everything For You' is almost too laid back, and much better live. The innersleeve has some good live and studio shots.

Angus I think this album suffers from the period of only 8 months since the previous album (which I didn't like either). It seems to lack the direction and drive of previous albums.

Dan Actually I liked the album at the time we were doing it. In retrospect it was a bit indulgent to be honest.

Darrell I think it was the start of the indulgence. We thought that we knew what the kids liked. There's some good songs on there though, we've played 'I Want To Do Everything For You' live ever since.

Fanzine Faster and heavier than Play'N' The Game. Perhaps still a little self indulgent but a step towards what Nazareth used to do best. Some great songs keeping the bluesy touch with a much rougher edge. Failed to chart, but both singles did, just. Production comes across well. Front cover (painting of 2 sword fighters) is reproduced on the innersleeve with 4 band photos.

Angus Much harder hitting and more powerful than Play'N' The Game. A similar sound to Razamanaz but more modern and raucous.

Dan This was a reaction to Play'N' The Game because they liked the heavy metal side, well, there was no term heavy metal then, but the faster, harder side of Nazareth.

Darrell I love the title track, total balls to the wall. I think it's a definitive Nazareth track, a bit like what we were doing 6 years earlier.

Fanzine 9/10 Almost another classic.

Angus 8/10 Easily eclipses the previous 2 albums.

Dan 9/10 A good reaction to the previous one.

Fanzine The introduction of another guitarist really gave the band a big push in the right direction. It sounds like Manny was given a real kick with the song writing and performance when Zal joined. Several steps on from Razamanaz, this was the first time since then they had that much raw energy and freshness. No Mean City is the album that introduced me to Nazareth. One of their heavier albums, it made the charts, as did 2 of the 3 singles. Dan's vocals are probably more gravelly than ever before, or since. One of the few albums to contain no coverversions, this album shows one of the best all round. Definitely a heavy metal album. Dark doomy cover done by Rodney Matthews in a typical style (also seen on LPs by Diamond Head, Magnum, Eloy and many others). Came with a very nice merchandise slip (which you'll now be lucky to find intact) and a picture innersleeve.

Angus The primary reason for buying this album was the cover as I'd never heard ANY(!) Nazareth before. the musical contents did not disappoint, being completely over the top in places without sounding at all bad.

Darrell It was a fabulous experience having Zal Cleminson in the band. I will never regret having him around for one minute. It lent a new side to the band. The chemistry sparked something, a slightly different dimension.

Dan Very down to earth. It's just how we felt at the time. With the introduction of Zal it just turned out that way. Not only the songs but the sound and the feel of it all.

Fanzine This album is personally not a favourite, although it does show very good song writing. Some of the songs really do stand out, like 'Turning A New Leaf' and the single 'Holiday', but I'm primarily a fan and the album doesn't have the punch or feel of previous efforts. Musically I can't fault it. Met with a poor reaction in the UK but sold very well in the rest of the world. After the accompanying tour, Zal quit to form his own short lived project. He has now given up to sell computers.

Angus This sounds a bit like there was some New Wave influence creeping in, although 'Heart's Grown Cold' is a superb emotional song and is easily the best on the album.

Dan I love the album. I thought it was great. Again it was another change in the band, but it was the stuff we were writing too. It's the first time we used session people and tried to expand the band a bit. I think what started was getting the other guitar player in, and waiting for other inputs, because you can't keep doing the same thing and not get bored. We tried other things here and enjoyed it. You can't please everybody, in this case the British fans, and yourself. You just go with what feels good at the time. It was brilliant in America.

Darrell I liked 'Holiday' and 'Heart's Grown Cold', to an excessive degree, I thought they were 2 fabulous tracks. We weren't being smart arsed, we were growing as musicians, and we wanted to display more.

Dan Around that time there was the big AM/FM thing. FM was great for us, as it wasn't a profit making organisation, playing what you liked and what the kids like. Then radio became a business about that time. It was like 'You won't play, it says here on the computer print out' and all that changed the music scene.
